There is some damage outside holdings where cattle move in and out on a daily basis but with the wet conditions it is inevitable. To date, nothing particularly serious has been noted.

2018/9696 FORMER AGISTER RAYMOND BENNETT

It is with great sadness that we have to report the passing of former Agister, Raymond Bennett.

Raymond was born on 25th August 1930 at Mockbeggar Farm. He passed away on Monday this week, the 15th January 2018, aged 88 years.

Appointed in January 1959, Raymond served as an Agister for 2 years until December 1960.

Raymond was reappointed in 1975. Raymond was due to retire in 1995, however, it was agreed that from August 1994, Raymond would take semi-retirement; the Verderers not wanting to lose his knowledge and skill until such time as a replacement Agister could be appointed and trained.

However, Ray broke his collar bone shortly after that decision was made and so the Verderers kept him on as a full time employee until mid October at which time he reduced his hours and began to work part time.

Raymond retired fully at the end of August 1995. In the September 1995 Open Court, Raymond was presented with a Barry Peckham painting of his birthplace, Mockbeggar Farm.

Raymond was a real Forest character with years of experience Agisting and running his own stock on the Forest and he always had a story to tell!

Raymond passed away peacefully in the nursing home in which he has been living in recent years.

ANIMAL ACCIDENT REPORT

2018/9697 THE ANIMAL ACCIDENT REPORT FOR DECEMBER 2017 & THE YEAR AS A WHOLE

The Agisters attended 17 accidents in December. This compares with 29 in December last year.

5 ponies were killed and 3 were injured and had to be destroyed. 1 cow was injured.

1 accident occurred in daylight, 4 at twilight and 12 in the dark.

3 accidents in December were not reported by the driver involved.

7 motorists are known to have been local.

The total number of accidents in 2017 was 134. The previous year it was 146. That is a welcome reduction.

The number of hit and runs was also down, 14 in 2017, 17 in the previous year.

In 2017, 78 animals were killed or injured, compared with 98 the previous year; so again, that is a welcome reduction.

2018/9698 COMMERCIAL DOG WALKING

Presentment by Mrs Mary Gray, Practising Commoner from Brook

Mrs Gray asked that if and when the subject of commercial dog walking is raised again, the Court would support some control over the number of dogs that can be allowed to be walked on the Forest off lead, by one person. Recently, a commercial dog walker was seen walking on Brook Common with ten dogs, only one of which was on a lead. The Forest stock in the area at the time ignored the dogs but Mrs Gray expressed concern that later in the year when there are foals and calves about, there could be problems.

NEW FOREST NATIONAL PARK RECREATION MANAGEMENT STRATEGY
Presentment by Mr Brian Tarnoff, Chairman Habitat & Landscape Committee, New Forest
Association

'Last summer the National Park authority conducted a survey as part of its much needed Future Forest initiative to review its Recreation Management Strategy (RMS). While this was a great success of public engagement, with 1500 responses from online and the New Forest Show, raising the profile of the RMS, the survey itself was poorly constructed. Tomorrow, the meeting of the Park Authority members will review reports on the results before taking them to the RMS Steering Group, made up of the six statutory bodies including the Verderers.

Although the Findings Report admits that no attempt was made to get "a balanced and representative sample", it then presents some results as authoritative, with unwarranted exaggeration. For example, the concluding report states "The consultation responses suggest that there is wide public support for the England Coast Path."

In the survey, fifteen topics were offered with a limit of 6 to choose for comment. These were lifted from the 2010 Strategy document, each with incongruous headlines presented out of that context. These were at best confusing, at worst seen as manipulative leading statements. This unhelpfully constrained much debate to those topics.

One of the topics was "Coastal Access", accompanied by this summary "Implement and promote the England Coast Path and associated access rights when the Government's consultation is complete and the route is confirmed." This provided no explanation that the "Associated rights" included coastal margin / spreading room which would potentially turn 3500 acres of our most sensitive breeding and wintering bird habitats into access land. This includes up to five overlapping layers of national and international designations including an Area of Special Protection from which even the landowner is barred. I've previously highlighted other downsides of this project which could bring disturbance to our most remote habitats.

It is more than likely that few had heard of the ECP outside of the survey, or would have nominated it, if it hadn't been mentioned. 23 (Of 528) respondents thought "the route will attract people away from more sensitive inland areas" (the polar opposite of the truth). The topic was selected and in the absence of any downside explained, commented favourably by 343 respondents. This leaves me mystified as to how the interpretation then concludes "wide public support", a very strong extrapolation of 22% of 1500 respondents. If a less than a quarter support a proposal, is that wide? If mooted, absent its implications, is that even valid?

Although I do not doubt the hard work, enthusiasm, and sincerity of those conducting this opinion poll. Please do not take as a referendum what has been a useful PR exercise, but falls very short of providing anything more than the vaguest bellwether. The Recreation Management Strategy should be driven primarily by the need to fulfil the purposes and protect the special qualities of the National Park. While the survey may be taken as a launch event for the RMS review, the "results" should be taken with a tipper lorry of salt. The review should focus on specific and practical steps for Management of Recreation not another list of aspirations promising delivery of recreation. We rely on the Verderers to provide leadership and imagination to constructively take this forward.'

It is thought that in future, subsidies may be paid via statutory commons councils or the like. In the New Forest that may be the Verderers.

The Court feels strongly that future schemes must benefit the environment and support commoning but must not encourage the sort of increases in stock numbers that have resulted from the present BPS.

The New Forest Pony is on the Rare Breeds Survival Trust's Watch List. At present it is categorised as a breed 'At Risk' which means that since 2016, it has moved further towards rare breed status. Previously it was a 'Minority' breed. The suggestion was made that for the purposes of subsidy schemes, pure bred ponies should be valued at a whole livestock unit rather than 0.8 of a unit as at present and it was suggested that pure bred geldings should also attract a payment under the Verderers Grazing Scheme.

2018/9713 NEW FOREST SPRING CLEAN
