The cattle are thriving as well. Quite a few pigs are being marked although there aren't quite as many acorns as was originally feared. Some young trees have a lot of acorns whereas some of the older ones haven't. The foals are looking very well.

2023/13044 DRIFTS

DISCHARGE

The Head Agister reported that on the whole the drifts are going well. One didn't go as well as hoped, but the Agisters have received plenty of help.

There are a lot of people about on the Forest and the roads have been very busy. A cycle event clashed with one of the drifts and there was a Triathlon on the day of the Dur Hill Drift which we didn't know about. The participants were, however, very accommodating. The odd person has parked outside a closed car park and at Longdown a runner was aggressive towards a Ranger. As the person was remonstrating with the Ranger, a group of ponies came running past and the runner realised the danger, apologised and said on reflection, he could understand why he had been stopped.

Police attendance at the drift has been greatly appreciated and the Rangers have provided lots of help which is also gratefully received.

DISCHARGE

The Head Agister said that he attended a meeting recently with New Forest District Council and Forestry England. The text system set up to record interactions with the public has recorded 535 engagements in July and August. This equates to 7 or 8 each day.

2023/13047 BREACHES OF THE BYELAWS

RESUME

Mr Deakin reported that there are no byelaw breaches requiring action. There have been a few instances which are more of a nuisance such as a riggy steer and a bull which escaped from a field. Both animals were quickly dealt with.

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE PREVIOUS MEETING

2023/13048 COMMONERS' DWELLING SCHEME

DISCHARGE

The Official Verderer said that changes to development contributions are proposed within the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill. This may provide an opportunity for additional funding to support Commoners's Dwellings in the future.

The OV spoke about the difficulties commoners are having when trying to finance the building of new Commoners' Dwellings. He said additional money from developers might be available to put towards creating a fund from which commoners could borrow. It would provide a special mortgage facility for this purpose only. At present the restrictions on the selling on in future of Commoners' Dwellings, while ensuring the dwellings remain available for commoners in perpetuity, mean that they are not acceptable to commercial mortgage lenders as security.

The Head Agister opened the Court with the usual proclamation.

ANNOUNCEMENTS & DECISIONS

2023/13049 ENCROACHMENTS

In June the Chairman of the CDA expressed concern at the ever increasing levels of encroachment in the Forest.

Forestry England works closely with us in assisting in abating encroachments within the New Forest, when they are on Crown Land. The Court provides its support to the CDA's encroachment committee when encroachments on privately owned land are identified.

When responding to requests for searches of the Atlas of Forest Rights from Solicitors, Conveyancers and others, we explain that portions of land lying outside the hedge, fence or wall of a property in areas to which commoners' stock has access, will be subject to rights of common. This explains that such land must not be fenced or otherwise enclosed, or the grazing diminished in any way, because to do so will constitute an illegal encroachment. Solicitors and conveyancers are asked to ensure their client is aware of the information provided.

Despite these efforts, encroachments remain a serious and increasing concern to the Court.

2023/13050 BRAMBLES AND BRACKEN

In July, we received two presentments concerning brambles and bracken. Forestry England monitors both species and considers works to try to control them via the Open Forest Advisory Committee (OFAC). Control is, however, limited by available resources as well as the measures which are permitted on the SSSI. The Deputy Surveyor said he welcomes specific areas being notified to FE.

2023/13051 FEEDING OF FOREST ANIMALS

Once again, it is the time of year where people may find they have a glut of apples and other fruits. We appeal to residents and other members of the public not to put out anything on the Forest for the animals, especially near or on the roadside. Doing so is extremely dangerous and inconsiderate. It encourages animals to the roadside and puts them at greater risk of being involved in road traffic accidents. Even if it is not by the road, depositing anything for the Forest animals to eat creates a potential risk. Carrots, especially when chopped, represent a real risk of choke and consuming too many apples may give a pony or donkey fatal colic. It also leads to aggression and injury as animals compete for the food.

2023/13052 DRIFTS

The pony drifts are now well underway and we ask the public to avoid the areas where they are being undertaken, the dates and locations of which are notified on the Court's website as well as on social media. The drifts are an essential part of the management of the Forest pony herd and the presence of members of the public is a safety risk, to the public and those undertaking the drift.

ANIMAL ACCIDENT REPORT

2023/13053 THE ANIMAL ACCIDENT REPORT FOR JULY & AUGUST 2023

The Agisters attended 9 accidents in July & August this year compared with 11 in the same period last year.

3 animals died – 2 ponies and a pig.

A pony and a Cow were injured.

In 4 instances no animals were found injured following reports of accidents.

5 accidents happened in daylight, the other 4 in the dark.

3 drivers failed to report having collided with a commoners' animal.

The total number of animals killed and injured in the year to date is 22, compared with 27 in the same period last year.

PRESENTMENTS BY THE PUBLIC

2023/13054 ANIMAL ACCIDENTS & AVERAGE SPEED CAMERAS

Presentments by Gilly Jones, Commoner and lead on the New Forest Roads Awareness Group

Good morning Official Verderer, Verderers and Members of the Public.

I'm Gilly Jones, Commoner and lead on the New Forest Roads Awareness group.

My presentment this morning is, as always, regarding livestock deaths within the New Forest.

On Sunday 3rd of September, crossing in the B3054, near Norley Wood I saw a colt foal, with an agister aware sticker on. I went up the road to grab the animal accident

sign I had put up the week before, where a mare was killed. Her foal stood over her mother body for hours, not understanding why she wouldn't get up.

The little colt foal had suffered horrific injuries, of which I have supplied you photos of. The attending agister had to put him out of his misery at 7am in the morning, after he was seen and reported at daybreak by a passing member of the public. His mother Jet reenacted what I had seen the week before. She again could not understand why he wouldn't get up. The driver did report this, but many hours later. Leaving him suffering for approx. 9 hours.

Imagine my disbelief, to get a call on Tuesday morning, to hear that Jet had been killed in another RTA at the Norley crossroads on the Monday night. Not only her, but another foal was killed. His mother was also injured.

Again, the driver reported it hours later, maybe because of photos I had posted on social media.

As you all must know, I have been at, over the last decade, some of the worst RTAS within the Forest. Spending my New Years Day 2021 on the side of Roger Penny Way with 4 dead ponies, two of which had been turned inside out, should make you realise, nothing shocks me anymore. But standing with Jet, seeing her broken legs etc seriously broke me.

I want two things to happen out of this. I would like to have support for a major campaign to get people to report accidents immediately, I know that legally they have 24hrs, but leaving livestock suffering like this, should have some kind of recourse. We also need to make sure that Hampshire Police uphold the sharing agreement, and Agisters are given drivers details easily.

I also now strongly urging we relook at the call for Average Speed Camera, Not only on the B3078 now, but also the B3045. From Dibden Purlieu cattle grid to Bull Hill grid and extend Beaulieu's' 30MPH limit to all of the Estate boundaries.

I am aware that there may still be work looking into this, but if there is I am not being kept in the loop. Which I am finding frustrating, as I am the one in front of a tv camera or on a radio station, trying my hardest to spread the messages about safer driving within the Forest. I think it is getting to a stage where it is disrespectable to myself and the teams I work with. If we do have a feasibility study, and ASC's are rejected, the study must come up with other options.

We do have an Animal Accident Reduction Group meeting next week, and I hope that just maybe I can get some answers there.

The NPA have printed cards with the numbers to call, what 3 words is an app that is now known to help call takers locate accidents. The Young Commoners are changing the signage within the Forest. Op Mountie is out as much as we can. Villages are restarting Community Speed Watches. Local residents are now invested in helping the cause.

Annoyed about this situation as I am, I still want to end on a positive, accident figures are still going the right direction, and so much work is going on to reduce them, but we are heading into winter, and the darker mornings and evenings.

Please for the sake of the livestock, can we investigate the problems I have highlighted and look into how we can improve what we are doing.

2023/13055 CLAYPITS BOTTOM NEAR BRAMSHAW TELEGRAPH Presentment by Mrs Ailsa Farrand

Further to my presentment in July - when I asked that the infilling works at Claypits Bottom should be halted – work had started there without warning two days before the Court – and without the Freshwater and Wetlands Restoration Forum seeing any information (despite my numerous requests), and my asking why the HLS was not adhering to the strategy unanimously agreed by the Forum and the HLS Board in 2019.

It appears that this SSSi site has again been repaired with clay untested for compatibility with the different freshwater and marine clays in this area, which includes the unique Studley Wood geological SSSi immediately downstream, on a site that had planning permission refused in 2016.

The claim that mitigation measures exist against damaging the internationally important geological site immediately below these works has never been disclosed. The latest works area ends as the stream enters a deeper section which still shows the remains of previous attempts at repair, leaving wooden stakes exposed, and old heather bales where there is nothing to stop the latest infill material washing downstream as before into the Studley Wood site.

Surely this requires closer scrutiny by those responsible for these proposals, including a specific HRA assessment of the potential effects of the sediment flows on the stream flora and fauna?

The Official Verderer as Head of the current 5-year extension of "The Verderers of the New Forest Higher-level Stewardship (HLS) Scheme" is asked to ensure that the necessary ecological and geological safeguards are implemented for these works. He is also asked to ensure that there is full transparency regarding the operation of the Scheme in line with the National Audit Office 2017 recommendations regarding improving monitoring, local communication on planned schemes, their impact, and the remediation of sites within the community.

SUBSIDY PAYMENTS TO COMMONERS

Presentment by Mrs Bickford-Smith, Farmer (Commoner – not currently practising)

My name is Immy Bickford-Smith. I have lived in the New Forest for more than 30 years and I'm a farmer. There appears to be confusion about past subsidy payments and uncertainty about how New Forest farmers should be supported in the future. Some background information may be of assistance.

During the Foot and Mouth (FMD) crisis of 2001 more than 1000 New Forest cattle were slaughtered on the Defra 'welfare scheme' – not because the disease got here but mainly due to inadequate holdings and lack of 'back up' land when stock had to be removed from the common land for disease control purposes.

Forest Friendly Farming was set up as a direct result of that disaster and I was part of the marketing and development group that came up with the idea of the 'Producers Directory' and the 'New Forest Marque'. We promoted Quality not Quantity of stock for the long term sustainable future of farming and commoning. [*1]

In 2003 a Countryside Stewardship Scheme (CSS) was introduced in the New Forest and the Agreement with Defra included:

"The advice of English Nature is that stock numbers should not be allowed to fall below 3,500 or exceed 7,000. At these limits the mosaic of New Forest habitats

would be destroyed or severely damaged and additionally, at the higher limit there would also be concern for animal welfare.....There is no ecological justification for supporting more than 5,000 cattle/ponies on the Open Forest."

The scheme paid £60 per animal turned out to graze for a minimum specified period.

5,000 individual animals was also the figure recommended by the Illingworth Report (1992) as being the appropriate stocking level [*2]

The Single Payment Scheme (SPS) farm subsidy "Flat Rate" 'Entitlement to payment' was gradually phased in between 2005 and 2012 to replace production based farm subsidy. [*3] In March 2005 the Minister announced that one 'eligible hectare' of New Forest common land and one 'Entitlement to payment' would be allocated for each Livestock Unit (LU) grazed in the New Forest in 2004.

1 cow = 1LU and 1 pony or donkey = 0.6 LU. The Press Release explained the "SPS Entitlement to payment" was expected to be worth between £200-£220 p.a. [*4]

Some 450 farmers declared their New Forest statutory registered rights of common as 'land at their disposal' on their SPS Application forms.

But only 260 were granted a share of the common land eligible area and subsidy.

158 claims were made based only on ponies grazed in 2004

31 claims were made based only on cattle grazed in 2004

71 claims were made with a mixture of animals.

However - the allocation announced by the Minister only accounted for a small proportion of the subsidy and eligible area available [*5] In October 2007 the Verderers announced that Defra had agreed to treble and backdate payments to the successful Applicants.

The original allocations were increased to 3.03 "SPS Entitlements to payments" and hectares per Livestock Unit. Entitlement values varied each year but in 2013 they were worth approximately £270 each. That provided a payment value of some £800 per New Forest Livestock Unit that year (£270 x 3.03) [*6] But so many were given no share at all of common land farm subsidy.

More subsidy could be obtained with additional ponies or cattle each year and stock numbers increased to 9,000 by the end of the SPS in 2014.

From 2015 the SPS became the Basic Payment Scheme (BPS) and all New Forest common land farm subsidy was paid on a stock headage basis every year. The eligible area was reduced and reallocated in proportion to the number of ponies or cattle used to make claims. By 2020 numbers had increased to nearly 15,000. [*7]

In 2021 a reference amount replaced headage payments but numbers are still significantly higher than the 5,000 individual animals previously desired.

There are several small scale New Forest farmers and commoners with statutory registered rights of common attached to their private agricultural land who refrained from turning out stock and claiming headage payments because of their concerns about the legality of the schemes and/or because of the unprecedented number of animals already turned out. They kept their land in good environmental condition to help increase biodiversity in the New Forest but have been seriously disadvantaged for many years as they were refused any share of common land farm subsidy.

I trust this will not happen again in the future.

Mrs Bickford-Smith had included some additional notes.

CONSIDERATION OF PRESENTMENTS

2023/13057 ANIMAL ACCIDENTS & AVERAGE SPEED CAMERAS

DISCHARGE

Everyone agreed that Gilly is doing an excellent job. She has done more than anyone else to help reduce animal accidents.

The OV said that the feasibility study has been completed. The only barrier to installing Average Speed Cameras on the B3078 Roger Penny Way is the Joint Operations Unit for Roads Policing (JOU) position that Department for Transport guidance does not support their introduction. The OV added that he is continuing to pursue this at the highest level in the hope of clarifying the DfT's, position in light of the special circumstances where depastured stock have access to the highway or, if required, obtaining an amendment to the quidance.

The issue of drivers delaying the reporting of accidents is obviously very concerning. Whilst the law says drivers must report an accident as soon as practicably possible, and in any event within 24 hours, in the case of an RTA involving an animal which may be badly injured, the report should be made immediately. Under the Animals Act, there is an obligation to reduce suffering. It was agreed a letter should be sent to Hampshire Police asking if consideration can be given to taking drivers to task who don't report animal RTA's promptly. The Clerk reminded the Court that prosecuting drivers for hitting animals has not been encouraged because it may discourage them from reporting accidents altogether. The Court agreed, but felt that a substantial delay in reporting an animal injured in a road traffic accident causes unacceptable and avoidable suffering. Therefore, while the Court's position is not changed regarding the prosecution of drivers who report hitting animals, it will support action against those that fail to report promptly.

Action OV/MG

The Animal Accident Reduction Group is due to meet this month. The Clerk will raise the question of reducing the speed limit to 30 mph in Beaulieu Village. She will also obtain the map showing the locations of RTA's involving Forest animals.

2023/13058 CLAYPITS BOTTOM NEAR BRAMSHAW TELEGRAPH

DISCHARGE

Following the July Court, Mr Chatters visited Claypits Bottom and produced a very helpful report on the work that has been carried out and the results to date.

The DS said that the works were discussed and agreed at the May New Forest Freshwater and Wetlands Restoration Forum. An explanation of the work carried out and the reasons why they were needed is available online. Geological reports were carefully considered and when the works were undertaken, care was taken to ensure that no damage was caused to the area of geological importance. The proposals were also discussed at Quadrant Meetings and the Consultative Panel.

Mr Deakin added that unfortunately, a couple of members of the Forum, tend to object to most proposals. This has made decision making extremely difficult. Decisions are, however, always reached in a democratic manner with the majority view taking precedence. It is not always possible to please everyone.

An announcement in response to Mrs Farrand's presentment will be made at the October Court.

SUBSIDY PAYMENTS TO COMMONERS 2023/13059

DISCHARGE

Inevitably there are differing views as to the level of support which should be available to commoners. Possible future schemes are under careful consideration by a group set up for the purpose. The aim is to support commoning in a fair but sustainable way to ensure the optimum number of animals are depastured in order to maintain the Forest's natural environment.

MATTERS ARISING

2023/13060 LICENCING OF COMMERCIAL DOG WALKERS

DISCHARGE

FE is working with the NFNPA on the dog walking charter. The DS said that partly due to lack of resources, FE is not looking at licencing, or seeking to charge commercial dog walkers at this time. It is a matter that the Recreation Management Strategy (RMS) working group will consider in due course.

Members of the Court expressed their disappointment but understand resources are limited. The DS said that FE is aware of the issues.

Mr Manley said the New Forest Dog Owners Group is keen to support best practice.

DRAGONS TEETH ON THE ROAD TO BOLDERWOOD, CLOSE DISCHARGE 2023/13061 TO THE NEW FOREST INN

The best way of protecting the verges in this area remains under consideration.

2023/13062 FORESTRY ENGLAND DONATION REQUEST BOARDS

DISCHARGE

The DS confirmed any boards not removed from grazing so far will be as soon as resources permit.

The Court felt FE's lack of consultation before erecting the boards was disrespectful to the Verderers.

The Court expressed concern that this is in effect an extension of what is happening at Setthorns Campsite and that it is intensifying Forest campsite occupation.

Mr Deakin remarked that Holmsley is the one site where campers and animals do not mix and he believes getting rid of all the campsites from the Open Forest won't happen.

The Court, however, was prepared to accept the argument that there is a need to improve security during this coming winter and agreed that 2 warden's units may be placed on the site for this winter (2023/2024). Further justification will be required if this is to be repeated in future years.

It was pointed out that there is a pony drift on Sunday 5th November. The campsite will have been thrown open by that date and so the wardens residing on the site must be aware that animals will be on the site then and for the remainder of the winter.

Mr Chatters asked FE to provide a copy of the agreement that allows residential units on Setthorns during the winter, over and above the warden for that site.

2023/13066 THE REPAIR & MAINTENANCE/ENHANCEMENT LIST

2023/13067 LOST LAWNS CONSULTATION INCLUDING STRICKNAGE LOST DISCHARGE LAWN

The proposals were approved. However, Mr Pasmore expressed the view that the areas FE is looking at are too narrow. He said in his opinion there has been no regeneration in the A&O woods for the past 20 years. The DS said he has discussed this with Natural England which at present is happy with the current level of regeneration. Mr Pasmore disagreed and said he believes there should be more than just scientific consideration. He feels the woods are dying and that is a landscape issue which is not given sufficient

importance. Mr Deakin felt the proposals are not ambitious enough.

> After some further consideration and discussion, a vote was taken (3 against, 1 abstention and 5 in favour) and it was RESOLVED that consent should be given in principle that the mast can be sited on the edge of the car park at Coppice of Linwood on a temporary basis for up to 3 years. Full details will be required before formal consent is given.

> Mr Grugeon will seek details from the mast providers and bring a formal proposal back to the Court for consideration.

The event has passed the HRA and therefore FE has given consent. A similar event has taken place in other parts of the Forest for a number of years but with catering only. This time, a total of three trade/commercial units are requested.

Mr Chatters asked to see the HRA. Mr Pasmore requested a copy of the route as he has concerns at its potential detrimental effect on the nearby designated tranquil areas. Mr Stride commented that he believes it is a robust area in which to hold such an event but he also felt it would impact the tranquil areas. He added that whilst there are always people everywhere in these areas, the level would not be to the extent this event will generate.

A vote was taken in respect of the commercial units, the result of which was 5 Verderers voted in favour, 2 voted against and 2 abstained. The Court therefore agreed not to refuse permission.

2023/13091 CHANGES TO CLASS Q PERMITTED DEVELOPMENT RIGHTS

DISCHARGE

The OV has drafted a letter to Planning Development Management Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities Planning Directorate in London, expressing the Court's extreme concern at the negative affect redeveloping any existing barns into dwellings will have on the availability of properties with outbuildings suitable to support commoning in the future.

The Court feels the proposed change to Permitted Development Rights (Schedule 2, Part 3, Class Q, The Town & Country Panning (General Permitted Development) (England) Order 2015 as amended) does not contain sufficient safeguards to ensure the retention of buildings in agricultural use to ensure sufficient, affordable availability to support Commoning within the New Forest.

The New Forest is by far the most expensive UK National Park, with a current average house price of £650,000. This means that the value of an agricultural building as a dwelling, or dwellings, far exceeds that of it remaining in agricultural use.

Commoning can reasonably be characterised as 'subsistence agriculture' in that it provides little if any net financial income to practitioners and is primarily undertaken as a form of cultural heritage and environmental land management. Therefore, it is reliant on the availability of suitable land and buildings at a sustainable cost, be that for purchase or rent. Alternative, higher value uses for buildings that would otherwise be suitable for Commoning are already a significant issue for the long-term sustainability of the practice, any changes that would increase the loss of suitable land and buildings for agriculture would further endanger the future of this culturally unique and environmentally sustainable form of agriculture.

The Verderers response to question 31 of the consultation, "Do you think that the permitted development right for the change of use from agricultural buildings to residential use (Part 3 Class Q) should be amended to apply in other article 2(3) land?" is therefore No.

Should the Government be minded to extend the scope of Part 3, Class Q permitted development rights to Article 2(3) land, specifically National Parks, the Verderers ask that recognition be made of the unique environmental, ecological and cultural heritage circumstance of the New Forest, and that the New Forest National Park be specifically excluded from the provisions.
